Are they a member of a professional body such as the BIID?			
Do they have professional indemnity and public liability insurance?			
Have they explained how they will charge you for their services, including fees for design work, sourcing and supply of furniture/fixtures and equipment, project administration and site supervision?			
Do they use a client contract that covers what dispute resolution method you will use if the relationship breaks down, fees and payment schedules etc. The RIBA/BIID Domestic Professional Services Contract 2020: Interior Design Services is available to all designers.			
Have they made clear who or what you will be contracting with? i.e. when you sign the contract, will they sign the contract as an individual freelancer or sole trader or as a limited company?			
Do they have a Privacy Policy in place that explains how they will store and protect your data?			
Do they have a Complaints Policy in place that explains how they deal with client complaints?			
Do they have an Anti-Bribery Policy in place that explains what processes they have in place to prevent bribery and makes clear that they will declare to their client any payments or benefits they receive from contractors, tradespeople and suppliers?
